I continue to examine the lives of great American Masons to explore their impact beyond their public lives and delving into their Masonic careers. This month's featured Mason stands apart from many others in the Craft. When one thinks of Masonry and those who practice it, the thoughts that generally come to mind are those of craftsmen, financiers, and merchants, and therein generally the finest of their stock. This month's Mason, Marion Robert Morrison, had an illustrious career as an entertainer. Marion Morrison was born in Winterset, Iowa, in the late of May, 1907. At the age of nine, the young Mr. Morrison moved with his family to Glendale, California. In Glendale, Morrison was an avid and active member of the Order of DeMolay during his teen years. Upon his graduation from Glendale High, he led the football team to win the 1924 season championship and later enrolled at the University of Southern California on a football scholarship. At USC, Morrison pursued a degree in pre-law. During this time, he also maintained a strong connection to the values of Masonry, servicing good deeds and civic fraternity through membership of the local Trojan Knights and Sigma Chi chapters. An injury forced him out of school. Morrison was given a studio job as a favor from director John Ford, who would become one of his longtime friends. After working as, a prop boy he gained some uncredited acting experience which later gained him traction larger roles which evolved a leading role for films. The studio decided that Morrison needed a better stage name, and the name they eventually settled is emblematic of America and individuals as strength and morals.

As is made clear by Brother Morrison, that characteristics of an honorable man are those built up over a lifetime. Brother Morrison's youthful exuberance for civic duty and humanitarian prudence as exemplified by his lifetime of fraternity in Masonic-tangent organizations show that it is not a learned behavior to make the world better, but one of deep-seated character.
